Whereas, increased training, competency testing, and certification requirements for technicians in the institutional setting have led to the development of well-educated and highly skilled pharmacy technicians who undertake important roles and responsibilities in the medication use process

Whereas, in the rapidly evolving healthcare setting, pharmacy technicians need to advance their level of operations management to help institutions meet the increasing demands for patient-care services through innovative programs such as “tech check tech”

Whereas, tech-check-tech programs have been demonstrated to yield considerable time savings for pharmacists, which creates opportunities to expand pharmacists’ role in clinical services and improve patient care outcomes

Whereas, a multitude of studies have demonstrated that in the final verification of unit dose orders in the institutional setting, technicians can perform as accurately or more accurately than pharmacists

Whereas, with advances in technologies such as bar-code scanning, additional checks in the medication use process are already implemented during the stocking of automatic dispensing cabinets and at the time of medication administration
