• Kelsey Hennig, PharmD, BCPS received her Doctor of Pharmacy degree from Albany College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. Following graduation, she completed a PGY-1 residency at St. Joseph's Health Hospital/St. John Fisher College Wegman's School of Pharmacy and a PGY-2 residency in ambulatory care focused on rheumatology, nephrology, and public health at Albany College of Pharmacy and Health Sciences. Kelsey is currently a clinical assistant professor within the Department of Pharmacy Practice at Binghamton University School of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences. Her areas of teaching include, but are not limited to, nephrology and rheumatology therapeutics as well as interprofessional education. Her clinical site is an inpatient internal medicine practice at St. Joseph's Health Hospital in Syracuse, NY. Currently, she is engaged in research on evaluating the effects of interprofessional education on student learning as well as evaluating local prescribing practices of SGLT-2 inhibitors.

In Memoriam



Kurt Kleinmann

• NYSCHP remembers Kurt Kleinmann. Kurt was a former Director of Pharmacy at Montefiore Medical Center, Bronx, NY.

Mr. Kleinmann was a visionary leader and pioneer of hospital pharmacy. An early advocate for

pharmacy specialization and greater pharmacist involvement across the continuum of care, his forward thinking and keen insight helped advance pharmacy practice. Kleinmann was awarded the Harvey A.K. Whitney Lecture Award in 1994. In his Whitney Award lecture, Kleinmann closed with a reflection on how sailing translates into his everyday life. "I am a sailor," he said. "To be a good sailor, one must shift to a new track, or 'come about' as the wind changes. Pharmacy practice is continually changing. Do this with a caring heart for your patients."
