RESOLUTIONS*

Actions of the New York State Council of Health-system Pharmacists are expressed as resolutions submitted in writing according to the regulations of the NYSCHP House. Resolutions may register an opinion or may recommend action be taken by the NYSCHP. The resolution should be clear, concise, and specific. The substance should be well researched, and reflect the character and interests of the NYSCHP and the pharmacy profession.

Resolutions should be written in a common format. Resolutions have three parts: (1) the heading, (2) the preamble, and (3) the operative clause. It is one long sentence with commas and semicolons throughout the resolution, with a period at the very end. All operative clauses end with a semicolon except the final clause, which ends in a period.

HEADING

Committee: i.e. the committee in which the resolution is introduced. Topic: the topic of the resolution Sponsored by: List the sponsors whose signatures appear at the bottom of the resolution.

PREAMBLE

The purpose of the preamble is to demonstrate that there is a problem that needs to be solved or resolved. The preamble of the resolution does everything but propose the action or make any substantive statement in the topic at hand. Each clause of the preamble begins with "Whereas" followed by a comma and the next word should begin with a capital letter. The preamble, regardless of how many paragraphs should never contain a period. The last paragraph of the preamble should close with a semicolon, after which a connecting expression, such as "therefore, be it: or "now therefore be it" can be added. The statements contained in the "Whereas" clause have no legal effect.

OPERATIVE CLAUSE

Operative clauses are set to achieve the NYSCHP's main policy or goals on the topic. Each operative clause ends with a semicolon and the final clause ends with a period. Operative clauses should be organized in a logical progression and each clause should contain a single idea or policy proposal. The word resolved is printed in italics and is followed by a comma and the word "That" should begin with a capital "T". If there is more than one resolving clause, each clause should be in a separate paragraph. Each paragraph begins with the word "*Resolved*, That". A resolving paragraph should not contain a period within the paragraph.

Whereas, The... [text of the preamble]; now, therefore, be it

Resolved That ... [stating action to be taken].

*The Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure; Alice Sturgis, The New Robert's Rules of Order.

Registration of Pharmacy Technicians

Whereas, Hospital pharmacists have moved into clinical patient-care roles requiring more freedom from distribution, dispensing and manual tasks, and,

Whereas, Pharmacy technicians are being increasingly used to perform such work, and,

Whereas, There are large numbers of technicians working in hospitals in New York State over the past couple of decades; many in long-term employment, and,

Whereas, Pharmacy technicians give valuable support which enables pharmacists to use their cognitive services for better patient care, and,

Whereas, While not requiring knowledge framework of a pharmacist, the duties performed by technicians are often crucial; involving precision, trust, risk and excellence, and, oversight and regulation would be helpful for patient safety and quality of care, and,

Whereas, More technician participation and recognition should increase progress, accountability, efficiency, and job satisfaction in pharmacy practice, therefore, be it

Resolved That:

The New York State Council of Health-system Pharmacists supports registration of all pharmacy technicians in New York State.



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Event Highlights: Puerto Rico Mission Trip

I was deployed to Puerto Rico for 16 days as part of the Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) Mission Order Authorization developed by NYS Governor Andrew Cuomo,





NYS Department of Health, the Healthcare Association of New York State, and the Greater New York Hospital Association following Puerto Rico's request for medical assistance. Our EMAC 78-membered team consisted of various healthcare professionals of different disciplines from five New York Health Systems (Stony Brook Medicine, Mount Sinai, New York-Presbyterian, Jamaica Hospital Medical Center, and University Rochester Medicine). Of the 78-membered relief team I was the only pharmacist.

Our team was divided into several missions by a needs basis. My first assigned mission was to medical tents outside Hospital HIMA San Pablo-Fajardo which operated 12 hours per day. In Fajardo, the EMAC team (Stony Brook Medicine, Mount Sinai, and University Rochester Medicine) worked in the medical clinic tents seeing walk-in patients, logistical operations were overseen by the Disaster Medical Assistance Teams (DMAT), United States Public Health Service (USPHS) offered psychiatric services, Army personnel assisted in transporting critically ill patients to San Juan or the USNS Comfort, and local Puerto Rican volunteers provided assistance when needed (e.g., translation). We averaged 130 patients per day, with patients requiring treatment for infectious diseases, lower respiratory issues, puncture wounds, and other chronic disease state management (e.g., refills on medications). Patients requiring higher level of care were transferred to the USNS Comfort. My second mission was to the U.S. Navy's Hospital Ship USNS Comfort in Old San Juan which operated 24 hours per day. There I worked in the USNS Comfort pharmacy alongside medical professional Navy personnel which included physicians, nurses, pharmacists, and pharmacy technicians. The EMAC team for this mission included healthcare professionals from Stony Brook Medicine and New York Presbyterian. There were DMAT medical tents set up outside the Hospital Ship that triaged 500-600 patients per day and referring the higher acuity patients to the USNS Comfort. The USNS Comfort (the world's largest hospital ship) is well equipped with operating rooms, an emergency department, blood bank, laboratory services, and more.

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My pharmacist duties overall included patient education, reviewing drug and allergy interactions, providing pharmacy consultations (drug information questions/dosing/medication recommendations for disease state management and/or patient specific characteristics), preparing intravenous medications, recommending formulary therapeutic interchanges, verifying prescriptions and medications, and managing pharmaceutical inventory. In Fajardo, I was stationed in a "pop up" pharmacy which mirrored a retail setting and worked simultaneously with a DMAT pharmacist. The clinicians in the medical tents would order medications electronically on laptops that I verified and dispensed. We had a limited formulary, but were able to order items that were running low and usually received delivery the following day. Whereas on the USNS comfort, I worked in a hospital pharmacy setting, but all medical information (including prescriptions) was hand written. I worked with three Naval Officers whom were pharmacist and several Navy pharmacy technicians who rotated shifts. I worked long 12-hour days, but there was bonding time teammates – such as preparing our first Meal Ready-To-Eat (MRE), cleaning up the medical clinic tents, or setting up our mosquito nets prior to sleeping. On the USNS Comfort I was able to eat meals prepared by their kitchen staff and sleep in the racks onboard the ship. Although this was my first humanitarian medical mission trip, it will not be my last. I am grateful to have had this opportunity to provide medical assistance Puerto Rico. Through the collaboration with our EMAC, DMAT, U.S. Army, U.S. Navy, USPHS, and Puerto Rican volunteers I can say this medical mission was a success.
